Chinese Music Past and Present

Description: Grace Christus will be exploring an overview of Chinese music from ancient dynasties to the present blossoming of composers and genres. A look and listen to some of the distinctive instruments that color the Chinese classical orchestra as well as the influence of Western music on the direction of modern day Chinese genres. In addition, she will cover some of the many current publications available to music teachers who wish to explore the music of this ever-evolving and enigmatic nation.

Bio: Daughter of Chinese immigrants, Grace Christus has degrees in Piano Performance from the George Peabody College for Teachers in Nashville, TN, the Juilliard School and the Manhattan School of Music in NY. She has been teaching piano privately at Calliope Music Studios and from her home in Aurora, CO since 1990. As a composer, she has written music at many levels for piano, voice, and choir. For the last 10 years, she has taken delight in arranging folk songs from all over the world for piano and shares them on her Facebook page "Sign Me a Song of Your People". JoFoKe (pron: Joh-Foh-Kee) can be found performing as a solo artist, with her band "aNem (and them)" and duo project with Solomon Chapman, "Same Cloth". In addition to the aforementioned projects, JoFoKe is a highly sought after session vocalist, writer, vocal producer, director, clinician and performer.

When performing, JoFoKe uses her platform to advocate for suicide prevention and to #RemoveTheStigma attached to mental illness. A mental illness battler and suicide attempt survivor herself, she proclaims that, every time she lifts her voice, she is singing for her life! Her forthcoming debut single, "Count (Joy)" has become an anthem for audience members. As a result, she and her sister, Stacie Alexander founded the 'Count Joy Network'. CJN works to raise awareness about mental health issues and connect and expand access to treatment primarily in the Black community. JoFoKe and her network are committed to connecting each fighter to the resources they need to live, love, fight & count joy FOR THEIR LIVES.

We all know that music has profound effects on our lives well beyond playing an instrument. It is unlikely that you will ever find out every impact you have on your students lives- and I ensure you, they are plentiful and your hard work is valued by our community!



Editor's Note

Two weeks ago my student Clayton had his final lesson before beginning collage. He'll be studying film at C.U. Denver. He wants to be a director. Aronofsky, Tarantino, and Kubrick are his heroes. He's a tall, shy young man, as passionate with a tennis racket as with a Brahms Rhapsody. One of the pleasures of teaching him has been watching him surprise himself almost weekly. I hope he'll keep the taste for such surprises. They show no sign of slackening. He loves the piano and plans to continue taking lessons, but the new demands on his time and energy will dictate the feasibility of that.

This week my student Emily will have her final lesson before commencing a European gap year. Her first stop, Madrid. She has a keen interest in art history and restoration, making the call of the Old World a veritable siren song. For her, it was either find a room with a view in Europe or jump into an environmental studies program with an emphasis in international relations at Whitman College in Washington. A difficult choice even without factoring in the vicissitudes of a pandemic. But it's a choice she's now made. I could have told her what it would be, knowing her as I do.

I've taught Clayton and Emily since their feet could barely reach the phone books I'd stack in front of the piano pedals. I wrote out their first pieces in big bubble letters on colored construction paper. Today they're in musical conversation with Mozart, Rachmaninoff, Debussy, Bach, Ginastera.

But there is so much, too much, that I haven't gotten to with them yet. We've not adequately covered scales in thirds and sixths. They've done very little improvisation. They need more ensemble playing experience, and, I realize only now, I've done precious little to expose them to female and minority composers. As they depart, I can't help wondering if I've been wise enough, astute enough, humble enough, to help them transcend my own limitations as a pianist and musician; nothing so disconcerts as seeing one's own weaknesses manifest in one's students. I wish I could teach them for just one more year.

Emily and Clayton are now discovering that beginnings entail endings. As am I. Supposedly I already knew that, but it turns out to be one of life's favorite lessons and I still come at it as a beginner. My studio is losing two cherished students, and I stand blinking at the gap they leave, not in my schedule, but in my days, like some essential item - a tree, an old rattan chair, a loved face - gone missing from a house replete with memories.

But endings always hold the door for beginnings. I'm entering a new phase as a teacher. My students, current and future, will have a teacher who is better at what he does for having taught Emily and Clayton. I wish they could now have the teacher that teaching them has helped me become.

Just one more year. Is that too much to ask?

Perhaps it has been preparing to say goodbye to these two students, perhaps it is the pandemic, or the unrest in the world, perhaps it is watching my husband begin an exciting new career, or my parents grow older, or myself grow older, but something in me is craving beginnings. In 2018 I joined CSMTA. Re-joined, rather, after a decades-long hiatus. I tend to be wary of joining things. My usual way is to go it on my own. But working as a private piano teacher can feel isolating and I found I wanted the support of an organization purporting to know the business. I decided to take a chance on it. The choice has born fruit; at the 2018 CSMTA convention I met Ben Raznick. I immediately perceived a vibrant man, forward-thinking, passionate about music and the teaching of it. Last Fall, as he was considering taking on the DAMTA presidency, he asked me if I would be interested in joining the board and assuming editorship of this newsletter. I was, as ever I am, reluctant. I've never been on a board. I didn't feel especially qualified. But mainly I was reluctant to acknowledge that my heart had already said yes the moment the words were out of his mouth. It was just the kind of beginning I'd been looking for.

It's September - for teachers, a month of beginnings. I hope each of you is able to give a blessing to your own Claytons and Emilys, and welcome all the beginnings awaiting you.



DAMTA was also just recently approved by PayPal as a blue check verified non-profit, which means when you purchase our Fall








Over the summer I hosted my first Board Meeting as President, welcoming the Board to my home. Here I presented my President's Vision, encompassed by these five words:
