



Guidelines for Participants and **Teachers:**

- 1. Sign up to participate: Any Interested performers can sign up through their teacher and complete the form provided:
- 2. Preparation: The student should be prepared musically, but memorization is not required.
- 3. Performance Etiquette: Teachers should prepare their students with essentials for performance, including how to walk on stage, what to wear, how to introduce yourself and your piece, and how to bow.
- 4. Musicale Fee: We encourage a donation of at least \$10 per participant. Donations support DAMTA's scholarship fund as well as its ongoing operations. You can donate using the Donate Link on DAMTA's website, or pay in person before the performance.
- 5. Access & Participation: Each participating teacher should take up no more than 1/3 of the program length. Musicales typically last no longer than 60 minutes.
- 6. All Students Are Welcome and Supported: Students of all ages, skill levels, and instruments are welcome to perform in our musicales. Every student, teacher, and audience member should be supportive of the other participants.
- 7. Copyright Policy: Copyright laws must be observed; all music must be an original publication, licensed for reprint,

Why DEI Matters To Me

Studying piano as a little girl in Malaysia, I recall falling in love with how music brought me comfort and made me feel more whole. "I'll be a composer!" was my first thought. Unfortunately, the only music I knew and loved was by male composers like Bach, Beethoven, Mozart, and Chopin. My conclusion: "Women must not be very good composers..." In addition, I thought a composer had to have been dead for at least fifty years to be considered a "real" composer, and they obviously had to be of European heritage. The chips were clearly stacked against me! I considered being an orchestra director. Alas, from my limited knowledge of conductors, it seemed that men were better at waving their hands frantically in front of a group of musicians as well. Ever pragmatic, I finally concluded "I guess I'll just have to be a pianist..."

Many years later, I have since made an amazing discovery – the ability to make beautiful music is not limited by gender, or ethnicity, and it's not restricted to historical figures. Even more important, I would not be who I am and where I am today if not for the gift of getting access to the music lessons that changed my life.

Growing up in a developing country, one did not have easy access to classical music study and its resources. All through my teen years, finding an advanced piano teacher or accessing the only flute teacher in the region involved a weekly 6-hour round trip commute by public bus, by myself, across states.

I would not be who I am and where I am today if not for the gift of getting access to the music lessons that changed my life.

However, in comparison to many others, I was one of the extremely fortunate ones. Families who lived in even more rural areas, with lower incomes, or with physical or intellectual needs, would have never dreamed of the access to music study that I received.

In my elementary school years, I was a member of a traditional "Angklung" band. An *Anklung* is a single pitched, bamboo instrument that resonates when shaken. Each

player is responsible for just one pitch, shaking their instrument at appropriate times to produce complete melodies. I like to think my "talent" was the reason I was given responsibility for two pitches, "fa" and "fasharp"! However, truth be told, each personwas of value and needed to be heard, to bring any folk song to fruition. Looking back,

participation in this unique band and my exposure to these traditional Malaysian folk songs was a precious gift; traditional folk songs are now uncommon in the school curriculum in Malaysia. It would be a great loss if this rich musical heritage was forgotten by future generations in the prioritization of western music and songs.

To me, having variety (diversity), giving value to each person (equity), and advocating for opportunities and resources for children and adults who might otherwise never experience the power of music (inclusion), makes me more whole as a person and as a musician. When my children were growing up, we would take instruments to the Salvation Army homeless shelter to do early childhood classes with moms and children who were there in unimaginable circumstances. It was a lesson about the power of music, one that impacted us as much as those we served.

I share all this to explain why DEI matters to me. I am honored by your trust in choosing me for this new position, and I look forward tohelping lay the foundation for how CSMTA approaches diversity, equity, and inclusion in music study with the needs of the individual in mind. It is important to me that this is a

process that honors and values each student and teacher and that we advocate for those who would not otherwise have access to the opportunities and resources in this field we love. Like the *anklung* band, it will take each of us caring and working together to produce a beautiful and complete melody! •



Chee-Hwa Tan is the author of internationally acclaimed piano music published by Piano Safari, the Royal Conservatory of Music, Canada, and the Associated Board of Royal Schools of Music, U.K. She has served as Head of Piano Pedagogy at the University of Denver Lamont School of Music, as well as on the faculties of the Oberlin Conservatory and Southern Methodist University.

I have been cello for over 30 years. I started playing cello at age nine and instantly fell in love with the instrument. Music has been a core part of my life ever since.

Due to a repetitive motion wrist injury in 1998, where I had a ganglion cyst removed and the pain never subsided, I took a ten-year hiatus from pursuing the cello seriously. Although I remained in the music world, singing and playing with local bands, I had a longing to return to classical music. In 2010 I discovered that there was some surgical string in my wrist that was supposed to have dissolved after the surgery but never did. When they removed the string, the pain went away and I found myself with the opportunity to pursue my passion for cello performance. I believe that every person can benefit from learning to play an instrument, and that doing so will improve the quality of their everyday life. I now run a successful virtual teaching studio with over 45 students.

In my 10 year hiatus from playing cello I earned a Bachelor's Degree in Social Action through the Arts. I went on to work for several local arts based and human service nonprofits, and I have also sat on several nonprofit boards. Sitting on the DAMTA board as Secretary brings me great joy. It is fulfilling to bring my two worlds, of nonprofit work and music, together. I am excited about DAMTA's vision and what they provide for the music teacher community. It is a pleasure to be able to contribute my time to this organization.

My personal pursuits have included raising my now adult son Alex, studying classical yoga and Indian music for the past 20 years, and co-owning/managing Karuna Yoga and Wellness Center. I am proud to announce that on Sunday, October 7, 2023 at 2:00 p.m., pianist Elizabeth Smith and violinist Harrison Schumann will be performing my work, "Three American Folk Songs for Violin and Piano" at Grusin Music Hall on the CU campus in Boulder, Colorado.

I wrote the set a few years ago for my husband, Lan Vo. One evening, as I was preparing supper, I overheard him playing the beautiful folk song "Wayfaring Stranger" on his violin. I decided to make an arrangement for violin and piano so that we could play it together. As I began to work, what I had thought would be a simple arrangement quickly morphed into an original composition, a fantasy that made use of that haunting tune.

Then, what was one became three; "Shenandoah" and "Old Joe Clark" followed to completed the set.

I have an abiding love for that which is deeply American. Not the bleak, divided America we see leaning into conflict with itself and the world, but the America that gave the world Emily Dickinson, Toni Morrison, Aaron Copland, and Mark Rothko; the America of 574 indigenous tribes, the America built by the labor and genius of immigrants from every part of the world; the America of wide landscapes and cityscapes, of quilts, shape notes, Shaker hymns, spirituals, Appalachian folk songs, Jazz, hiphop, and protest songs. It is an America that, far from turning from the difficulties of its past and present, responds to it with art of surpassing variety, depth, and spirituality. It is from this America that I drew my inspiration for these three pieces.

I'm very proud of them.

I met Elizabeth Smith at the 2022 CSMTA convention, held at CU. At a masterclass given by William Chapman Nyaho and Susanna

Garcia, she performed a movement from Florence Price's "Piano Sonata". She played - need I say it? - gorgeously. We got to know each other. Last week I sat in on a rehearsal. Having now heard Elizabeth and Harrison (her fiancé) play my pieces, I can only say that they will be giving them the kind of performance most composers only dream of! • David House
